<u>Map work 1</u> The coastline is where land meets an ocean or sea. Print out a blank map of the United Kingdom, then complete the tasks listed. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Colour and label the countries of the United Kingdom on the map. • Draw around or highlight the United Kingdom's coastline on the map. 	<u>Human and Physical features</u> Coastlines have many physical and human features. Write sentences to describe physical and human features, with examples. Then, complete a table with the following headings: picture and name of coastal feature, type of feature (human or physical) and description.	<u>Coastline Erosion - information poster</u> Visit the website BBC Bitesize - Coastlines - erosion and watch the video to learn about the physical process of erosion, which changes the coastline over time. Create an information poster to show what you have learned about erosion and how it changes the coastline. Include a title, facts and one or more pictures with captions.	<u>Safety at the coast - poster</u> Write a list of things that children and adults should do to stay safe at the coast. Examples include, taking notice of warning signs, and children being with an adult when near water. Once complete, use your list and what you have learned to design a poster to help people stay safe when visiting the coast. Include a title, bright colours, pictures and important information.
<u>Grace Darling and James Cook</u> Find out about Grace Darling and Captain James Cook. You may: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Draw a portrait of Grace Darling and Captain James Cook and add a caption. • Research and write about when they lived, what they did and why do we remember them today. 	<u>Coastal artwork</u> Create a coastal-themed piece of artwork. Get creative!	<u>Make a beach hut or beach scene</u> Can you make your own beach hut or beach scene out of a shoe box?	<u>Map work 2</u> The coastline is where land meets an ocean or sea. <u>Coastal Books</u> Choose a story with a coastal setting to read. Examples include "Winnie and Wilbur at the Seaside" by Valerie Thomas, "The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch" by Rhonda Armitage or "The Mousehole Cat" by Antonia Barber. On a separate sheet, draw a story map or mountain to retell the key events from the story. Write a caption for each picture that you draw.	<u>Flag</u> Design a coastal flag.	<u>Charity Research</u> Research a charity that helps the coastline.	<u>Coastline Backpack</u> Write a list of equipment you need to keep safe on the coastline.
